# Land Negotiations Update Letter from the Chief

Hello:

As a result of the hard work and extensive lobbing to various parties, specifically, Matthew Coon Come of the Assembly of First Nations, and Charles Fox, Ontario Regional Chief, Chiefs of Ontario, the land transfer process may be finalized by December 2002. On May 1, 2001, Sand Point First Nation met with negotiators from Ontario and Canada to address the outstanding issues hindering the land transfer process.

The outstanding issues have been resolved, namely, Environmental jurisdiction and clauses pertaining to Navigable waters.

I am pleased to report that the land base negotiations have been accelerated and are in the final stages of the negotiation process.

I will report the progress to band members, as more information is made available.

#### **Economic Development Update**

Hello,

So reported in last month's newsletter we are working very hard to ready the park for the 2001 camping season. We have been successful in receiving funding from FedNor to contact a business firm to prepare an operating business plan.

The Operating Business Plan will be finalized by May 4, 2001, however, there are still issues that must be addressed very quickly prior to the official opening of the park.

Within the next few months we will be initiating an economic strategic planning process. At this time we are seeking letters of intent and resumes from Sand Point First Nation Band Members interested to sit on the Committee. Chief and Council will complete final selection. The deadline for interested applicants is June 29, 2001.

The Strategic Plan will capture the economic aspirations of all community members as there will be two consultation components:

- 1) Development of a Shiels Inventory and Training Plan
- 2) Entrepreneurship Opportunities

The Economic Strategic Plan will be targeted at developing short (within one year) and long (up to five years) term goals for economic development.

#### **Household Hints**

#### Kitchen

- Double the life of soap filled scouring pads by cutting them in half,
- Scouring pads will never rust if you sprinkle a little baking powder in the bottom of the dish in which they're stored.
- A burnt pan will scrub out with less work if you apply a paste of baking soda and water and allow it to sit several hours or overnight.
- Hard to clean pots wash out easily if you boil bay leaves in them for 15 to 20 minutes. Use a small amount of water and cover pot.

#### Natural Bug Repellents

- Dried bay leaves—good for kitchen cabinets
- Coffee grounds---good for doors and windows
- Petroleum jelly—fill in the cracks in walls or around the sink
- Mint leaves---plant them near entrances and windows
- Cayenne pepper—good in cabinets or on counter tops
- Whole cloves---wedge them into corners of cabinets, or drawers



#### Wild Rice and Corn Salad

(Serves 4)

4 cups water

1-teaspoon salt

2/3-cup wild rice

2 ripe tomatoes

3 scallions

1 cup cooked corn kernels

1/4 cup olive oil

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

Salt to taste

Freshly ground black pepper to taste

1/4 cup silvered almonds, toasted

Washed lettuce greens

#### Method

Bring the water and salt to a boil in a large saucepan.

Add the wild rice; reduce heat, and simmer, partly covered, until tender, about 40 minutes.

Drain and rinse rice under cold water.

Peel, seed, and dice the tomatoes. Chop scallions, including the green tops.

In a bowl, combine the wild rice, tomatoes, scallions, and corn kernels.


In a small bowl, whisk together the olive oil, balsamic vinegar, and salt and pepper.

Pour over wild rice-corn mixture and toss.

Adjust seasoning to taste. Let stand, covered, at room temperature until ready to serve. (you can prepare this several hours ahead.)

Add toasted, slivered almonds, toss, and serve on lettuce greens. ENJOY!

# An update on licensing

The law requires that firearm owners be licensed by January 1, 2001.

1.7 million Canadians have already complied with the licensing requirements of the *Firearms Act*.

And recently, Canadians have sent in their firearms licence applications in record numbers. To meet this overwhelming demand, temporary licences are now being issued to eligible firearm owners.

Public safety remains the cornerstone of the firearms program.

For example, temporary licences are only being issued to those who are successfully screened against Canadian Police Information Centre (CPIC) databases. And, like current licence holders, those with temporary firearms licences will be continuously screened against police databases. Firearms licences will be issued only to those found eligible after further screening.

These public safety checks conform to the *Firearms Act* and keep firearms away from those who should not have them.

Temporary licences will be issued to eligible firearm owners who applied in the fall. Temporary licence holders are not permitted to acquire firearms. However, they will be in legal possession of their firearms and they will be able to purchase ammunition as of January 1, 2001. Temporary licences are only valid until June 30, 2001 or until those eligible receive their 5-year licence.
