## FOR YOUR INFORMATION:

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is taking steps to remove <u>PHENYLPROPANOLAMINE</u> (<u>PPA</u>) from all drug products and has requested that all drug companies discontinue marketing products containing PPA. In addition, FDA has issued a public health advisory concerning PPA. **This drug is an ingredient used in many over-the-counter and prescription cough and cold medications as a decongestant and in over-the-counter weight loss products**. PPA has been linked to hemorrhagic stroke. Also, it has been linked to increased hemorrhagic stroke (bleeding in brain) among women ages 18-49 in the three days after starting any medication that contains this substance. Many companies have voluntarily reformulated and are continuing to reformulate their products to exclude PPA. Please read the labels of over-the-counter products to determine if they contain PPA. The FDA recommends that consumers not use any products that contain PPA.
